Word of God:

• Old Testament: Psalm47

Message:

This is Ascension Sunday. Well, I am calling it Ascension Sunday because Ascension Day was actually Thursday. The Ascension of Jesus signals that the fifty days after Easter are almost finished and next Sunday will be Pentecost.

Usually I find Ascension Sunday something that should be recognized and not that difficult to write about and present. This week, however, I am finding it difficult. I am having a difficult time thinking about the three mass shootings that happened in the last two weeks in the United States which are so horrific and nonsensical with the joy in which the gospel of Luke describes the ascension. Actually, I am having difficulty with the statistic that I heard this week that said there is a mass shooting - that would be four or more people killed - every day in the United States. That is a great deal of hate, anger and cruelty.

However, I found this helpful. One person pointed out that this last chapter of the gospel of Luke could have been written at the time of the destruction of the temple - and to be fair a good part of Jerusalem. Along with the destruction of the temple would have been the killing of many Jewish people. Rome kept control of its provinces by force. Sometimes I forget how brutal the Roman military machine could be. If one destroys every thing including people in one's path, the people will soon do what they are supposed to do. They were into a campaign of fear and terror. Even if the gospel was written a little before the destruction of the temple, there seemed to be a sense that this was going to happen.

Luke is reminding the Christians who have moved out of Jerusalem and up into the northern region of Galilee away from the Roman soldiers that they worship God whom they know in Jesus Christ. They need to remember the awe that they had for the power that Jesus Christ demonstrated that he had and used among them. It was the power to heal people. It was the power to feed people. It was the power to calm storms that threatened people. They needed to remember that Jesus' death was not his destruction but a showing of Godly power in his suffering, death and resurrection. God could go into those places of suffering and death and find life. Offer life.

I have heard and preached about the ascension, the time where Jesus sends the disciple out to all the nations starting in Jerusalem to tell everyone about the risen Christ. In the gospel of Luke, we see that the message that the disciples are bring with them is about the repentance or the life changing experience that they had and the forgiveness of sins that they found in Jesus Christ. After all Jesus calls them to be the witnesses.

I have been fascinated by those words - repentance and the forgiveness of sins. Why would the disciples need to be reminded of repentance and the forgiveness of sins? Who would they have to forgive to take the message of Christ to them? Where they fearful and angry?

We are told that they were fearful. The disciples were hiding in an upper room from those who had crucified Jesus. I would imagine that they were probably angry as well. Angry at those who supported the crucifixion. Angry at those who killed Jesus. Angry at Judas who betrayed Jesus. Angry at themselves for not being willing to go with Jesus to the cross.

I just noticed this week that the gospel of Luke keeps reminding the readers that Jesus keeps interpreting the Old Testament showing that the Messiah was going to suffer, die and be resurrected. This was the prophesy. This was God's plan. The disciples did not need to take revenge on behalf of God. They did not need to blame themselves for not being stronger, more powerful, more dedicated. Jesus makes that very clear that this was not what he needed or wanted. They were not to resort to hatred and cruelty on his behalf. If Jesus had wanted to go that route He could have done that himself. This was never the path of the Messiah.

I am going to go back to the gospel of John where Jesus tells the disciples so many things during the last supper. He tells them that they are to love one another. He tells them that they are to abide in God, the source of this love. They are to follow in the ways that Jesus has taught them. They are to find ways to care for the people around them. This is also a message to the first readers of these gospels. By the time the gospels were being written, there was a great deal of violence happening. They are not to get caught up in the cruelty of the day and get lost in the hate. They were to care about people because the gospel is a promise that there is repentance and forgiveness.

Our friend had been bugging us for weeks now to watch the movie entitled "A street cat named Bob". We finally took the time to watch it on Monday evening. He said that we would like it and we did. The story is about James Bowen, a real person living in London, England, who was befriended by a cat during the time that he was trying desperately to quit drugs and turn his life around. When Bob first found James, James tried to find the cat's owner because he was very sure that he would forget to look after the cat. He was just scared that he would not take care of it properly. Of course, Bob had decided that he was living with James. So James took him everywhere with him because his housing situation was not that safe. He did not want to leave Bob at the housing project. There are great shots of Bob riding on James' shoulder with his harness on to keep him safe.

What struck me about this movie was the ability of this cat to make James care enough about his life to get clean from drugs and live in society again. Social services provided just enough that the scales might tip in his favour to get off of drugs. They could not care enough for him like Bob did. It was interesting to see people react to him differently when he was with Bob. Suddenly James was a novelty and people paid attention to his busking. Some also looked out for him and brought gifts of food and tiny knitted scarves for Bob. One person called out to James using the term 'sir' and that was when he knew his life had actually changed. No one had ever called him 'sir' before. Lots of other names but a term of respect. This all happened because of Bob, the cat. I have wondered while writing this sermon if God sent the cat because no one else seemed to be caring enough for this person. Would God do that?

Somehow, when we hear the words in the gospel of John, they sound easy. Sure, we can love one another. We can get alone with each other. But when relationships become difficult and are

broken then I think we become more hesitant about living by Jesus commandment in the gospel of John. We find those words of forgiveness and repentance in the gospel of Luke as possibly unattainable. Yet, God believes it is possible.

I am wondering as everyone is analysing what went wrong in Uvalde, Texas, if there was a teenager who needed someone to care a little more about him and what he was doing. I do know a couple of things about him even at this distance. He was lost and he did not know how to care for those around him. And no one took the time to notice how lost he was.

The disciples are called in the gospel of Luke to start in Jerusalem. I hear this as a call to start where you are. We are here and there are lots of people here who need to know about forgiveness, about repentance and about caring. John spoke last week about us needing to learn about this ourselves. We need to believe that we are needed here. As we learn this, we need to continually share this need. This is where God says that lives can be changed. This is where the power of God's Spirit is.
